REV. DAVID CHAO'S EXHORTATION

Rev. David Chao, the Honorary Chairman of Kairos Communication Service International, accepted the invitation from the Executive Director and, on the morning of July 20th, visited the Kairos office along with his wife to visit both current and former colleagues, offering encouragement and challenges. Afterward, they shared a meal with the staff, continuously showing care and inquiring about the various needs of the staff and ministry.

At the age of 91, Rev. David Chao is physically robust and mentally sharp. Drawing inspiration from Paul's expression of purpose to the Corinthian church, he encouraged everyone by saying, "For what we preach is not ourselves, but Jesus Christ as Lord, and ourselves as your servants for Jesus' sake." (2 Corinthians 4:5). Rev. David Chao recounted the history of Kairos and urged the staff to consider themselves as servants, not acting on their own will but proclaiming Jesus. He emphasized the importance of becoming servants to others, meeting the needs of others, and becoming vessels that God can use. Rev. David Chao further challenged the staff to be attentive to the changing times, noting that media has progressed and evolved significantly over the past few decades. He encouraged Kairos to have ambition and think about doing things that the church has not been able to achieve in spreading the Gospel through media.
